Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Christus resurrexit! Resurrexit vere! Christ has risen! He has truly Risen!

For the past several weeks of Lent, we have prepared ourselves for this moment, to celebrate the dawn of New Life in our lives as we witness and participate in God's power over death itself. Even though we celebrate today, there may be many things on your mind right now. You may be worrying about...a job, a family member's health or your own health, a child, a parent, or our world. You may be feeling lonely or alone, sad, hopeless, or wondering where your life is heading. Our celebration does not take away those sentiments or invalidate them. If anything, when we celebrated Jesus Christ's Passion and Death on Good Friday, so many of those personal experiences rise to the surface. But on Easter Day, God takes these things that cause us pain, anxiety, and the things that bury us, and raises us from those experiences to a future where they no longer exist. This Good News may not make a lot of sense to many, but it is the cornerstone of our faith. It is why women and men since that first Easter morning centuries ago, have been proclaiming that Jesus has risen. It is why people have given up their possessions, gone to the ends of the Earth to serve others, and even given up their lives.

Sisters and Brothers, let us joyfully share in this Easter hope, that despite our difficulties, there is joy and peace because we are known and loved individually as daughters and sons by the One who created us, sustains our very existence, and gives us life every single day. May your faith be strengthened this Easter Season as you truly experience the Risen Lord in your life.

A big thank you to all our staff and parishioners who have made these days so special in our churches by their work and sacrifices. A particular thank you our music director Alix Jerinic and our talented musicians and choir members who lead us in our worship each weekend and contribute in a particular way with the music of Holy Week. Thank you to those who helped to decorate our churches so the environments reflect the mysteries we celebrate. And finally, we thank those who made an offering for Easter flowers.

I am pleased to announce that starting May 1, Father Jerry Murphy will be assigned as a part-time Parochial Vicar to our parish while also ministering as part-time chaplain to Kaiser Hospital, San Francisco. As some of you know, he has been residing at the St. Thomas the Apostle Rectory since the fall and has been joining us for some of our liturgies and events. Now that he will be officially assigned to the parish, we will be seeing him more often in the various parochial responsibilities of the parish. I should add that even though he will be part-time at the parish, we will not be adjusting the parish Mass schedule. We are not sure how long he will be assigned to our parish or hospital ministry. Reflections on the Mass and Sacred Liturgy The Easter Season

The Easter season begins on Easter Sunday and continues to Pentecost Sunday. During these fifty days, Christians celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord with joy and exultation as one great Sunday.

The first eight days of the Easter season are celebrated as the Octave of Easter. This octave, in many ways, treats every day of the octave as Easter Sunday itself. At Mass, the priest prays in Preface 1 of Easter, in reference to the resurrection of Christ, that it is our duty at all times to acclaim the Lord but especially on this day when Christ our Passover has been sacrificed. Likewise in the First Eucharistic Prayer, which is the Roman Canon, the priest speaks of how the Church is celebrating the most sacred day of the Resurrection of our Lord in the flesh.

Finally, the dismissal at the end of Mass concludes with a double Alleluia every day of the octave. At this time, the deacon or priest dismisses the assembly with the usual words, but after the dismissal adds alleluia, alleluia as a sign of the great joy of the Church as she celebrates the Resurrection of the Lord.

Finally, from the solemnity of the Ascension until Pentecost, almost all of the collects at the beginning of Mass pray for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. Then at Pentecost itself, as the Church celebrates the sending of the Holy Spirit, the priest prays that the gifts of the Holy Spirit may be poured out upon the whole world so that the hearts of believers may be filled with the divine grace that was at work at the first proclamation of the Gospel.

In His Presence The Eucharistic Revival at St. Monica – St. Thomas the Apostle Focus for March - Suffering and Pain

At one time or another, all of us are hurt. We may fall down, get sick, have a medical procedure, be afflicted by a chronic illness that affects the body and/or mind, or someone we know is sick and our pain comes from watching him or her suffer. Suffering is a difficult part of being human to. It is also a perennial question that we often ask of our world, "Why is there suffering? Why does God allow suffering? How can there be suffering and a loving God?" Questions like these are particularly appropriate in Lent as suffering and pain is a theme that appears in various ways. Just think about how Lent began with Jesus in the desert fasting for 40 days. He was hungry during his fast and that meant he experienced pain. Then of course as we close in on Easter, there will be Holy Week when we read about his Passion and Death. He experienced the mental anguish of his suffering as well as the physical reality of being tortured, and of course death. This season of Lent



Jesus suffers along with us as we face our own trials. That makes the individual experiences and lives of Jesus and us close to one another, and as such, we may say we are *In His Presence* when we find ourselves suffering.


